

Treasurer's Report By Gary Roth

Last year was a financially challenging year. For the third year in a row, the revenue from club dues and participation fees were down due to declining membership and fewer club members taking the TSC trips. In spite of the declines, the TSC was extremely successful in saving more than the revenue shortfall. The plan was to have a surplus of \$2,840 and we ended the year with a budget surplus of \$10,377, which leaves the treasury in excellent condition. The year before last, the TSC donated \$10,000 to the Texas Ski Council Youth Foundation. This year puts the TSC Treasury back to the level before that donation.

The Bid Meeting in San Antonio is a major source of funds for the TSC operations. Even though the expected meeting revenue was under plan by \$1,432, the cost savings achieved by Mary Beth Wilson and Anne Myers was terrific. They beat their cost plan by \$5,513, which put the meeting \$4,081 above the plan. Please join me in thanking Mary Beth and Anne for a job well done.

This was the first full year for the TSC Youth Foundation and it had a strong financial year too. The foundation started the year with \$10,000. There were 35 qualifying children on the Fall Roundup Trip and the foundation gave \$100 to the parents (or grandparents) of each child to help defray travel costs. The tour operators, vendors and resort operators are very supportive of our efforts to attract and retain families to snow sports. They



showed their support with their wallets. In some cases they donated items for raffle and some of them donated cash. The result was that the foundation collected more in donations than was spent and now has \$10,865 in its accounts. The Trip VP's were especially helpful in raising this money. This gives the foundation a strong financial base for the future.

As I write this article, the council has prepared the budget for next year. A large part of the budget is for travel costs to attend Board and Delegate Meetings. As you all know, the cost of travel has increased significantly for both driving and flying. It will be a challenge to

break even next year.

- Participation Fees for all Trips are due on October 1, 2006
- 3. Activity Fees are due 30 days before the trip departs

Big Mountain Race Results

Winter Expedition--Levi, Finland by Peggy Montgomery, TSC VP of Marketing

Holoykynkolokyn or Cheers in Finnish! Well, the group that went to Finland found it incredible!!! The trip started with a small group going early to Copenhagen. Copenhagen is beautiful--it does not have tall sky scrappers because the city government controls the height of the buildings because of a number of old towers style buildings would be blocked ruining the view of them--Copenhagen is called the city of Spires. It also has this incredible pedestrian walkway that is the oldest brick pedestrian walkway today, starting at City Hall and going through a remarkable shopping district. The pedestrian and bike traffic is incredible, particularly bikes as they are constantly ringing their bells. The city tour was excellent and included a tour of one of the Queens palaces where she receives guests and a changing of the guards at her home. One of the best known attractions is the Trivoli, an amusement park in the middle of the city, which supposedly was the inspiration for Disneyland

The time in Copenhagen was much too short, but all were excited to head out to Levi, Finland. We met up with some of the main group in Stockholm and then the rest in Lulea where we boarded a bus for Levi and the skiing part of our trip. While in route to Levi, we had a longer than expected planned stop at the Artic Circle to obtain another bus because one of the original buses had trouble. We were all amazed at how quickly another bus arrived considering the distances between towns! All were tired from a long day of traveling, but the buffet meal that awaited us was a great end to the day. We found the Levitunturi Spa Hotel to be excellent accommodations with large rooms and a second smaller room and heated bathroom floors. The design was definitely had a Swedish influence with clean, distinctive lines to the furniture.

The next four days we skied at Levi, which was primarily accessed by a gondola and T-bars. According to Doug with Beyond Boundaries, however, the area is planning to put in chair lifts within the next couple of years. I think all of us will agree that is an excellent idea! The mountain was not large, but everyone enjoyed the skiing. I think we were all a bit surprised that the cold was not as bad as expected and we had daylight from about 9:00am to 4:00pm. One day a group traveled to Yilas, another Ski area and on the way back stopped at a Snow Village with an Ice Hotel, which everyone enjoyed. Besides skiing different groups toured the near by city of Rovaniemi and a Lapland Museum, with a stop at the Article Circle to see Santa Claus on the way home. There was also a snowmobile safari one evening in search of the Northern Lights. Many also enjoyed trips to the Reindeer Farm and Dog sledding trip and of course all the spa facilities. While shopping was limited in Levi, many managed to find gifts to take home.

The last evening started with a Vodka tasting at the hotel and then a farewell dinner at the K-5 Kammi restaurant which was a traditional Lapland hut and entertainment by Laplanders. The meal was incredible with numerous types of reindeer dishes and glowfried salmon--salmon cooked on a wooden plank in an open fire.

We all agreed that the timing for our departure from Levi couldn't have been better as it had gradually been getting colder each day we were in Levi and the morning we left, we definitely knew we were above the Article Circle. We made one last stop at the Artic Circle on our way back to Lulea and a flight to Stockholm. Arrival in Stockholm was to its first snow of the year. While the temperatures were not as cold as Levi it seemed colder because of how wet it was. The city tour, including a tour of the Wasa Museum (a museum centered around a wood ship from the 17th century that sunk shortly after being launched) was great and many opted to get off in the walking shopping district of Stockholm to finish out the afternoon. That evening we had our final group dinner at a local jazz club called the Stampede, where the food was outstanding and jazz wonderful!

The next morning the main part of the group departed for the States, while a small group boarded a ship for a post trip extension to Tallinn, Estonia. The group cruised overnight to Tallinn, spent two days touring the Old Town. They once again boarded the ship for a return overnight cruise to Stockholm and the flight home.

Doug Lofland with Beyond Boundaries and Merja Hart with The Travel Experience, the local Finland tour operator, did an incredible job on this trip making a memorable experience for all.



Final Showdown Jackson Hole, Wyoming March 10-17, 2007 Mike Morris – Trip VP

Not many views in the continental United States can compare with the beauty of the Teton Range in western Wyoming. In addition to the Jackson Hole Resort, there are lots of other sites and activities to keep us busy on this trip. There is Yellowstone National Park, the oldest national park in the US. There is Grand Teton National Park, which borders Jackson on the north side and provides cross country skiing, snowshoeing and snowmobiling in the winter months. The National Elk Refuge is also on the north side of town and hosts around 10,000 elk that spend the winter months in the area. Another area ski resort is Grand Targhee Ski Resort that is less than an hour drive from Jackson. This mountain is known for getting even more powder than Jackson Hole. The mountain of Jackson Hole

Resort contains about 2500 acres of in bounds terrain. They also have one of the longest vertical drops in North America of 4,139 feet. Almost half of the in bound terrain is considered beginner or intermediate with the remainder advanced. There is also about 3000 acres of back country terrain for those more adventurous types. On an average March day Jackson Hole will have about 1 skier per acre of the in bounds terrain - no lift lines! They also average over 450 inches of snow a year and a 21 average winter degree daytime temperature. If those numbers hold next year it should make for a perfect day on the mountain. Everyone will begin arriving on Saturday. There are about twelve jet fights a day into the

airport at Jackson. After a short drive, you will be checking into your lodging for the week. We will have a welcome party at the mountain on Sunday. There will be opportunities to sign up participants to go on mountain tours, snowshoeing, dog sledding, snowmobiling and on sleigh rides through the Refuge. We may include a TSC day at Grand Targhee. The club and individual races will be held later in the week as will the awards party. It looks like most everyone will be staying at the Resort on the mountain, but town is just a short ride away. There you can enjoy shopping at some truly diverse retailers, fine dining and quality night life. I hope to see you there! I should be going on my site inspection this summer so if anyone has questions or concerns please let me know.
