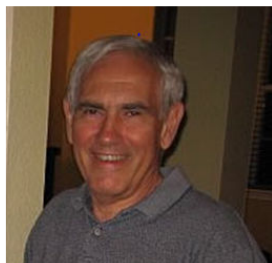

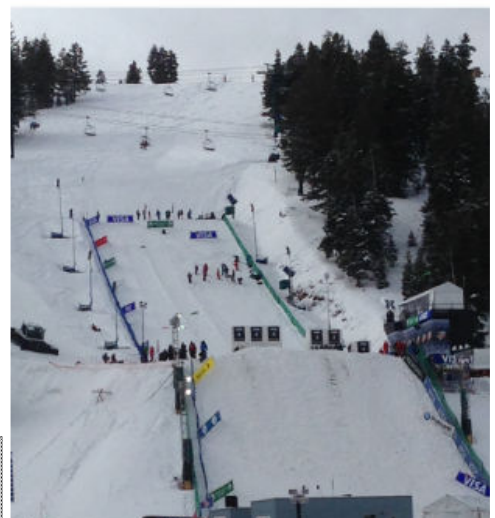

## Garmisch-Partenkirchen Trip Report with Berlin and Prague Extensions January 21 – February 4, 2014

Several of the intrepid travelers participated in a fascinating pre-trip extension to Berlin, highlighted by a half-day trip to historic Potsdam and the castle of San Souci. Everyone had the remainder of their days planned around Berlin's numerous sight-seeing opportunities. This included the Pergamon Museum, the primary visitor attraction of the several museums on Berlin's Museum Island and home to more than 6000 years of cultural history. After puffing up and the down the one-foot stone steps of the ancient altar, everyone headed to nearby Berlin Cathedral and gave thanks they survived.

Many visited Brandenburg Gate, Checkpoint Charlie, views from the Bundestag's fabulous clear dome, and the expansive shopping at the megastore KaDeWe. On Friday, after three full days in Berlin, the extension group traveled by bus for the long journey to Garmisch-Partenkirchen where they met up with the main group. They had flown into Munich earlier that day and had a Munich city tour, a walk at the Marienplatz and a beer at the Hofbrauhaus. We all met our tour guide Guenter Rieff and Birgit Neuner, the sales director of GarmischTourism who provided an informative orientation of the ski areas, local sights, shopping and town transportation.

Unfortunately, the snow conditions at the two ski resorts, the Classic Area and Zugspitze area, were not typical. The Women's World Cup downhill races were scheduled for the weekend of our arrival and the men's for our departure weekend. But due to unfavorable conditions, it had to be relocated to other European resorts. However, that did not stop anyone from sampling and

enjoying the two areas. A brave group traveled over 1 hour on a cog train, going up the mountain, partially through a dark tunnel. They raced to a tram that had a vertical rise to the 10,000 foot top of Zugspitze. The views from the top were fantastic. It was cold, it was windy, but they all faced the automated

This tour included a fascinating discussion of violin construction techniques by a student from Toronto. The violin museum also features an amazing variety of present day and historical stringed instruments.

Later on Sunday, we were treated to a welcome event in the town square featuring hot gluhwein, snacks and music by five Bavarians and their Alpenhorns. Many got a chance to blow into

the horn! At the event, John Salinas must have thought he was drinking hot chocolate, so when he added whipping cream to the gluhwein, it coagulated before his eyes!

Excursions included day trips to crazy King Ludwig's Neuschwanstein castle, a fanciful design that was copied for Disneyland. Another excursion was to Linderhof, another Ludwig castle, Oberammergau, famous for its Passion Play, Christian handicrafts and the beautiful Ettal Monastery with its brewery and distillery. Many took the day tour to Innsbruck, including a tour of the ski-jumping venue where we viewed practice only weeks prior to the Sochi Olympics.

Mega-shopper Ann Rogers, egged on by super mega-shopper Gloria Lopez, hit the jackpot with the purchase of a mink coat for €300 at a second-hand shop in Garmisch. She couldn't wait to walk in the door back in Houston and see the look on her husband's face. Rumors are she slept in it!

Following a chock-filled week of activities in Garmisch, the post-trop group boarded a train from Munich bound for Prague. The next day we were provided an interesting guided tour of Prague, first by coach and then a walking tour. Sights included the Prague Castle with the changing of the guard, the Charles Bridge, the Basilica of St. George. And of course, we were part of the hourly crowds at the 15<sup>th</sup> century Astronomical clock. Later, some took the elevator (or the more exercise conscious walked up) for fabulous views of the city. The views at sunset were particularly stunning.

Most everyone participated in the day tour to Pilsen, featuring the



brewery tour of Pilsner Urquell, the first Pilsner beer in the world. Even though the brewing and lagering is no longer commercially done in the 9 kilometers of underground cellars, the beer tasting of unfiltered, oak-aged beer was held there. The amazing fact is that from 1842 until the advent of refrigeration, the caves were kept cold year-round by ice which was mined and dropped into a huge underground room. The ice melt provided chilled water which drained throughout the caves to provide even chilling.

Some folks took a guided 3-hour Segway tour and were amazed at how well those vehicles performed up and down the hilly streets and sidewalks of Prague!

Those that participated in all of the trip segments had a full 14 days of sightseeing and adventure, but all participants flew back to Texas with wonderful memories, no matter how long their stay.

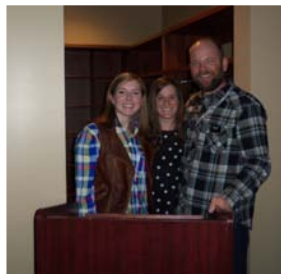

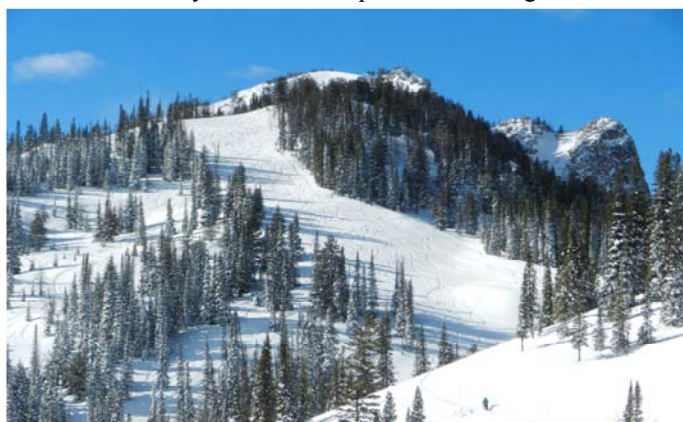
conquests for the ski week ahead (now that all had equipment and clothes!). Spencer Long welcomed the group to Jackson

**Summer 2014 By Ross Baker, Expedition Coordinator**

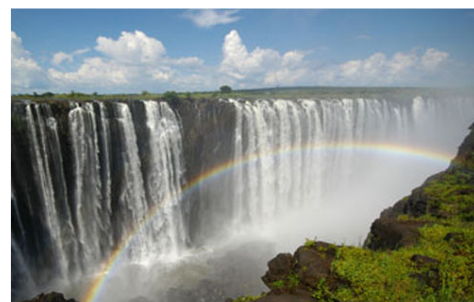
