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## Madesimo, Italy - TSC Winter Expedition 2015 Report

#### MADESIMO - THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES!

We had a total of 63 people from 6 clubs attend the trip to Madesimo. At Christmas the resort was pretty empty as there was very little snow. By the time the TSC arrived they had gotten 12 feet of snow. Yes that is feet! Snow was everywhere making it difficult for the buses to get to one of the hotels (mine). From what I heard the skiing was fabulous except for the wind a couple of days. It did manage to snow a few more inches while we were there making the skiers happy. Unfortunately for our skiers, 6 or 8 inches fell our final evening make it interesting for our descent down the mountain.

Hotel Le Meridiana, my hotel, was charming with typical European touches. The staff was enjoyable, attentive to our needs and a few spoke English. Hotel Andossi, where the majority of our people stayed, was also very nice with excellent amenities and English speaking staff. From what I hear, the staff went above and beyond catering to everyone's needs especially at breakfast where the chef was cooking eggs to their order. And in typical Italian style, the food was superb and way too plentiful in both hotels. By the 3rd night most people adjusted their ordering style and choose two of the first course instead of the heavy second course. Wine at both hotels was very reasonably priced. Most evenings you could see groups enjoying several bottles of wine with dinner and maybe even an after-dinner drink of Grappa. Speaking only for my group of dining companions, we were usually the first to sit for dinner, but generally the last to leave the room, having too much fun talking, drinking and planning the next day's adventure. I really think the staff missed having the wine drinking American once we left.

Madesimo is a small remote village at the top of the mountain. Even though the elevation at the base was about 4500 feet, it took about 45 minutes to get up the mountain from the next larger town of Chiavenna. Not that it was a long distance, but it had 27 hairpin turns up the mountain. That was just counting the 180 degree turns and not the other 90 degree or so curves along the mountain road. Now mountain passes don't normally bother most people in a car, but doing this in a 55 passenger bus adds some excitement to the drive especially when sitting in the front row. On our first morning arriving at the top, everyone in my bus gave the driver a standing ovation for his expert driving skills. For those planning to just ski Madesimo, the long route

up and down the mountain was not a problem as we were staying at the top. However, for those taking the day excursions, they got to experience the 27 hairpin turns several more times.

We did have 6 excursions during our week long trip. There were two different days of Italian cooking classes by 2 chefs. In my class we learned how to cook Risotto the Italian way which is much firmer than we usually have it at home. We also were shown how to make Tiramisu from scratch including the lady fingers, but it takes much more time than I am willing to spend. So I plan to continue to purchase this wonderful dessert in the future. The other class learned how to make pizza dough and pasta from scratch and then prepared 3 wonderful dishes.



Our first excursion out of Madesimo was to the Lake Como area with lunch in the village of Bellaggio which is where the lake splits into two branches. Participants were also treated to a ferry ride across the lake. On Tuesday afternoon, we had a well attended, half day trip to the town of Chiavenna where we had a lovely walking tour of the old town by the local guide from the tourist office. Then we boarded the bus to go visit Mamete Prevostini Winery to taste their house wines along with the local cheeses, sausages and breads of the area. Everyone was quite happy on the return trip up the mountain to Madesimo as we were through the 27 hairpin turns and back at our hotels before we knew it, just in time for dinner. In addition, Wednesday, about twenty people did a day trip into Milan to shop, explore the sites and eat. There was no tour of the city, so everyone did something different during the day, but all did see the beautiful Duomo, Milan's showpiece cathedral with an amazing roofline and most walked down Via Dante, the grand pedestrian boulevard and popular shopping area. ter was a great place to stroll and appreciate Italian fashion design both in the windows and on the local office workers.

I must say the best excursion was our Thursday trip to St Moritz by way of the UNESCO World Heritage Bernina train. We traveled 2 hours to Tirano to board the train to the cosmopolitan resort of St. Moritz, Switzerland. Most of us had no idea what beautiful sites were in store for us. This panoramic train lets you experience the beauty of the Alps in total comfort and style. The entire line is characterized by a series of breathtaking landscapes, through numerous tunnels, over more than 60 bridges and viaducts, including the famous Circular Viaduct of Brusio, and then curving up to a height of 2,200



meters passing the majestic setting of Lake Bianco and by the Bernia region's mighty glaciers to the world's most expensive ski resort – St. Moritz. This train route is a masterpiece of civil engineering and one not to be missed. This well attended trip had both skiers and tourist.

We pulled into the train station of San Moritz about 11am just as our cloudy snowy day turned to beautiful sunshine; however it was still very cold outside. About 12-14 people walked from the train station with their ski equipment up to slopes of San Moritz to ski at this world famous resort for the afternoon. The other 30 or so people just strolled the winding,



steep streets of the town to eat, window shop and people watch. Fortunately for us, there was much activity in town that day (great for people watching) as they were playing the Snow Polo World Cup matches on the frozen Lake St. Moritz. A few of us ventured up to the renowned Kulm Hotel to find lunch. Instead we found an exquisite lobby bar area with huge picture windows that over looked the Snow Polo matches below. Being cold from outside, we found 3 chairs in a sunny location, ordered 3 pots of amazing tea and just enjoyed both the stunning views over-looking Lake St. Moritz and the beautiful fashions inside the lobby. It truly was an experience of ultimate satisfaction for everyone on the trip.



Even though our stay included dinner nightly, eight of us ventured out to try some local fare that was highly recommended by others on the trip- Dogana Vegia. Be sure to come to hungry we were told, because as soon as you sit down the table is covered with appetizers of all kinds such as salami, cheese, olives, vegetables, beans and bread. The best way to experience this restaurant is to have Dario (chef/owner) select the meal and of course the wine. In no time bottles of wine appear followed by plates and plates of food before you realize they've brought out 6 or 8 courses. The old log cabin custom house has quite an eclectic charm with candles burning on every table. Since Dario was both our chef and waiter, we all had plenty of time to wandering around the

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many rooms to check out all the stuff on the walls. We were all shocked that we were the only people in the restaurant since not only was the meal outstanding, the experience is one we will not forget. In the words of Amie Rodnick "It was a magical evening!"

Friday we awoke to another typical day in Madesimo, a bit snowy. Several people skied another day, while others did a little shopping at the local stores. The Euro was in our favor making shopping a good deal. About 13 of us took the last of the cooking classes that afternoon. I don't think we were quite ready to depart Madesimo. By dinner time we had well over 6 inches of new snow. Most of us were not looking forward to our 27 hairpin turns down the mountain with snow covered roads, but there was only one way down. At dinner that evening we all toasted to a great week in Madesimo, to the new friends we made and the wonderful memories.

Today only 15 towers remain, but at one time there was more than 70 which made it possible to cross the town by rooftop rather than street. After lunch, your day continues with a special visit to a Tuscan winery for the opportunity to sample a selection of the local wines that have made Tuscany so well-known. In the evening you can explore the various dining options Montecatini Terme has to offer.

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On Tuesday we head to Florence, (about 30 minutes away) for a cultural tour of this magical city. Firenze is the "Cradle of the Italian Renaissance". Michelangelo, Dante, Galileo, gelato, red wine, amazing food – these are just some of my

favorite things about Florence. Our local Florentine guide highlights many of the city's priceless treasures as we stroll through the historic center of Florence. You will have plenty of time to explore the city on your own. Radiating out from the Duomo are Renaissance-era neighborhoods. Though the major-



ity of the sights are north of the Arno River, the area to the south, known as the Oltrarno, has it charms as well.



Wednesday you have the opportunity to enjoy a day of leisure to relax and experience the local flavor of Montecatini Terme. Remember this is spa town. Or perhaps you will choose to take an optional excursion to Pisa and Lucca. Pisa, best known for the Leaning Tower, is best seen on foot where your guide will show you the sites. Your option continues with a journey to historic Lucca, a charming fortress town filled with churches (99 of them), terra-cotta -roof buildings and narrow cobblestone streets. Here Caesar, Pompey and Crassus agreed to rule Rome as a triumvirate in 56 BC. For the most part motorized traffic doesn't exist in the historic center of Lucca so walking or biking is a pleasure in this flat city. Again dinner is on your own.

Thursday you will again visit Florence for a delightful day to explore the many treasures of this great city. Begin the day learning the traditional

Italian techniques of leather making during a visit to a family-owned leather shop. Then partake in a special presentation on the history and workmanship of fine Florentine gold. You will have free time to visit a museum, indulge in a Tuscan lunch

or shop for local crafts. Return to Montecatini Terme for a Tuscan feast featuring traditional cuisine and savory wines.



Friday we say goodbye to Montecatini Terme and head south to the cosmopolitan capital of Italy, Rome! You have an opportunity to enjoy an optional tour of Vatican City to visit the collections of the Vatican Museums and St. Peter's Basilica. Follow a local expert guide on a three hour, in-depth visit through the vast collection including the Sistine Chapel. Or explore the city on your own and visit some of the major sights. In the evening join your friends for a farewell dinner, and celebrate the end of a memorable trip to the unforgettable and everbeautify region of Tuscany.

Should you want to extend your trip to Italy, we have both a pre-trip and post trip option. The pre-trip is to the picturesque region of the Cinque Terre. The post trip is a two night stay in the historic city of Rome. Check with your club for your departure dates. If those dates don't fit your schedule, there are 5 other dates that may. Feel free to contact me for information on the other departure times. This Tuscany trip is one your will remember for a lifetime.


